UMM Student Named State's Top Psychology Senior

Leslie R. Meek, a senior psychology major who will graduate this June from the University of Minnesota, Morris, has received the Paterson Award naming her the Outstanding Senior Undergraduate Major in Psychology in the state of Minnesota.

The award honors Professor Donald G. Paterson, a major figure in the development of the department of psychology at the University of Minnesota. Meek was presented her award at the annual meeting of the Minnesota Psychological Association on April 27.

Meek lives in Elbow Lake, MN, with her husband, William, and two children, Jeanette and Andrew.

Dr. Ernest Kemble, UMM professor of psychology who has been Meek's academic adviser for three years, said that Meek has worked with him in various capacities: as a teaching assistant for three courses, as co-collaborator on at least 15 experiments, and as the psychology discipline student representative to the Division of Social Sciences.

"I think Ms. Meek is an extremely bright, talented and motivated person who has a bright future in psychology," Kemble said. "She is probably the best all-around student I've taught in 22 years."

Kemble also said that Meek is an articulate communicator and an effective writer. In fact, she has co-authored five research manuscripts, all of which have been accepted for publication.

"She has a clear grasp of research design and methodology, is meticulous and utterly reliable in data gathering," Kemble said, "and she has become a skilled scientific writer."

Three of the topics Meek chose to research and write about consist of the behavioral effects of the putative anti-aggressive drug fluprazine hydrochloride and on defense burying in rodents. These articles will appear in such publications as "Bulletin of the Psychonomic Society" and "Psychological Record." Another manuscript is the result of a research methods course she developed as a teaching assistant. Her original experiment investigates the effects of animal hand-

ling procedures on both rodent and student behavior. This has been accepted for publication by the educational journal, "The American Biology Teacher."

Yet another manuscript, developed because of her interest in instructional possibility of the conditioned burying paradigm in rodents, also resulted in publication in "The American Biology Teacher."

This cumulative effort in her course work prompted Kemble, along with Thomas Johnson, assistant professor of psychology at UMM, and Marilyn Boltz, former faculty member of the UMM psychology discipline, to nomi-

nate Meek for the Paterson Award sponsored by the Minnesota Psychological Association.

Apparently, there are eight graduate schools who share Kemble's assessment. She has been accepted for graduate study at the University of Colorado, Boulder; University of Illinois, Urbana; University of Iowa; University of Michigan; University of Minnesota; University of Washington; and University of Wisconsin. She has been offered a four-year Regent's Scholarship at the University of Michigan, a three-year psychopharmacology training grant at the University of Minnesota and graduate fellowships at the University of Illinois and University of Wisconsin.

"I would not have accomplished all that I have without the encouragement of the psychology discipline. The intellectual atmosphere at UMM encourages research and independent study," said Meek. "Dr. Kemble has been a tremendous example and spends enormous amounts of time with all of his students. By his example and with his help I learned how to research, study, write and teach."

Meek said that she has decided on the graduate program in bio-psychology at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, where she will be working with Dr. Theresa Lee. Her daughter will be studying at a college in Minnesota, and Meek said that it is most likely her husband and son will join her in Michigan.

UMM Concert Choir Plans 1990 China Tour Alumni Invited to Accompany Group

UMM Concert Choir director Ken Hodgson has announced the formation of a University of Minnesota, Morris Concert Choir tour of Asian countries planned for June, 1990.

Still in the early planning stages, the tour will focus on China with stops planned for the cities of Beijing, Nanjing, Canton, and several locations between each of the three cities.

Other possible destinations include Japan, Korea, Hong Kong and Taiwan. The tour group hopes to return via Hawaii, with at least one night planned for rest and recreation and one concert performance.

Alumni and interested friends are invited to accompany the Concert Choir on their travels. There may be a few openings in the choir for alumni

who wish to perform. The total trip length will run approximately 21-22 days. Those wishing to extend their trip through a longer Hawaiian lay-over may do so at their own expense.

Hodgson predicts that the trip expenses should not exceed \$3,000 per person, and may in fact be lower. The group is working aggressively to obtain reduced airfares, which constitute much of the expense. Group rates, based on double occupancy and private bath, will also help to lower the trip's cost.

Chancellor's Choice

We are winding down the enrollment process for next fall. As a matter of fact, we have already started to actively recruit students for the following year, 1990-1991.

We will enroll 525 new freshmen this September. Again, they will be an outstanding group who have compiled excellent academic records at their high schools. In addition to coming to UMM well prepared, they will have held an unusually large number of leadership positions in their schools and communities. Few of them will have graduated below the 80th percentile. Their average high school rank will probably be around the 90th percentile. We will have more National Merit Finalists than ever before. In other words, I guess that we can no longer claim that UMM is the best kept secret in the upper midwest.

To some extent, at least for next year, 1989-90, we may have to exceed our enrollment target of 2050 by about 50 additional students. This has occurred not because of too many freshmen, but because the retention rate may be higher than we anticipated. It could mean that each transfer student we admit will be in excess of the 2050 target number. We believe that it is important to admit about 50 transfer students, thereby making it possible that our total enrollment for next year may be 2100. The transfers we admit will be students who have completed most if not all of their freshman and sophomore years, and therefore, they should be taking less heavily populated upper division courses almost exclusively.

The enrollment bulge this year has caused some problems. Students have had difficulty in enrolling in the courses they want, and some of them have had to waste a good deal of time standing in lines. We are doing what we can to at least alleviate, if not eliminate, these problems.

President Nils Hasselmo spent a day on campus on May 5. He met with faculty, staff, students, and administrative groups, and with UMM supporters from the surrounding geographic area. I believe that I speak for everyone with whom he had contact, when I say that he continues to impress with his quick understanding of issues, his high integrity, and his marvelous sense of humor. President Hasselmo will also

speak at our commencement ceremony on June 9.

Some of you may recall an organization called the West Central Educational Development Association made up of prominent persons from the Morris geographic area. Since the 1950's, its purpose has been to promote and support higher education in this area of the state. The WCEDA was active during UMM's formative years. It engaged in legislative lobbying efforts and helped with projects related to student admissions. Recently, under the leadership of Warren Anderson ('73), the WCEDA has been rejuvenated. A special effort is being made to obtain members from outside of Morris. We are looking forward to working closely and productively with the WCEDA.

This article is being written two weeks prior to the end of the 1989 legislative session. It appears that the University of Minnesota's budget request will fare reasonably well on the operational side, and perhaps, much better than might be expected given last year's problems. Funding for capital improvement projects through the sale of bonds by the state will be minimal. It is anticipated that there will be a sizeable bonding bill during the 1990 session, when it is hoped that our Student Center along with some other needed UMM items will be included.

As many of you have undoubtedly seen in the Twin Cities press, four new University of Minnesota regents have been chosen. They include Jean Keffeler, Alan Page, Mary Page, and Darrin Roshka. Jean Keffeler is employed as a hospital administrator in the Twin Cities. She was a member of the Blue Ribbon Commission which recently evaluated the University's financial management. Alan Page is a former Minnesota Viking football player who is a lawyer working in the state attorney general's office. Mary Page is from Olivia, where she operates a drug store and where she served as mayor for six years. Darrin Roshka is the "student regent." He is a junior from Owatonna on the Twin Cities campus, where he is majoring in agricultural economics and political science. We are looking forward to working with these new regents and having them visit and begin to understand our campus as soon as possible.

Dan Noble To Leave UMM After 20 Years of Service

John Q. Imholte, chancellor, University of Minnesota, Morris, has announced the resignation of Daniel V. Noble, chief business officer of the campus for the last 20 years, effective July 31.

"A great deal of Dan Noble has been invested in UMM over the past 20 years," Chancellor Imholte said. "His contributions to the overall campus program have been numerous and of the highest quality. His rich background in both accounting and law, along with his active mind, have provided us with a rare human resource. Obviously we will miss him."

Noble, who is a St. Paul native, earned a bachelor's degree with a major in accounting from the Carlson School of Management at the University of Minnesota in 1961 and then worked out of the Chicago office of a large public accounting firm for four years, obtaining his credentials as a certified public accountant there in 1966. He received a law degree from the University of Minnesota Law School and was admitted to the state bar in 1969, the same year he joined the staff at UMM as business manager. He was named to his current position, vice chancellor for finance, in 1984.

"After 20 years as chief business officer of a college, it's time for a rest and then a new challenge," Noble said. "I have appreciated the opportunity to work for Jack Imholte all those years and have thoroughly enjoyed working with my dedicated staff and colleagues. I know I will miss the daily interaction with all of them very much when I leave."

Noble's future plans are undetermined at this time, but Noble said that he expects to be available to help with the transition to a new person in his position.

Latterell Earns University Award for Undergraduate Advising

Dr. Joseph Latterell, professor of chemistry at the University of Minnesota, Morris, is one of three individuals from throughout the University of Minnesota system to be selected to receive the 1989 John Tate Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Academic Advising.

This is the third year of the annual all-University award, which is presented to individuals who have made a distinguished contribution to undergraduate advising. Two awards are presented to those whose primary responsibilities include advising, and one award is given to someone for whom advising is not a primary responsibility.

Named in honor of the first Dean of University College, 1930-1941, the John Tate Award calls attention to the contributions advisers make in helping students formulate and achieve intellectual, career and personal goals. The award is jointly sponsored by the University College and the Office of Educational Development, and carries with it a plaque and a \$1,000 honorarium.

According to Dr. Elizabeth Blake, vice chancellor for academic affairs and dean at UMM, Latterell is noted for his undergraduate advising since he joined the UMM faculty in 1967 as an assistant professor. Over the years he has consistently maintained the largest number of advisees of any faculty member on the UMM campus — his current count is 40.

"He has consistently excelled at advising," Blake said. "He has put a lot of time and expertise into advising his own students, and has worked tirelessly to improve advising across campus."

Dr. James Olson, chair of the Division of Science and Math, said, "Dr. Latterell's skill as an adviser is well known by students, faculty and staff across the campus. Joe perceives advising as a process that assists students in sorting out the many personal, academic and career issues with which they must deal. He challenges each individual to become the director of this process and is always available for support as the need arises."

Danita Carlson, a 1988 UMM graduate, said, "When I sought advice, what I really wanted was someone to agree with my assessment of the situation,

tell me that I was doing the best thing possible and that everything would be just fine. Dr. Latterell did this. He gave me his honest opinion even though I did not particularly care about honesty at the time."

Latterell received his bachelor's degree from St. John's University, Collegeville, MN, his master's from Purdue University, West Lafayette, IN, and his doctorate in analytical chemistry from the University of Colorado, Boulder.

In addition to his teaching duties at UMM, Latterell has developed major innovations in the teaching of analytical chemistry, and he was the first and continues to be the contact person and organizer of the President's Distinguished Faculty Mentor Program, established as a university-wide program in 1986. Because of his efforts, Latterell was awarded a Black Student Union Award for Understanding and Concern of Black Students, a UMM University Fellowship, the Horace T. Morse-Amoco Foundation Award for Outstanding Contributions to Undergraduate Education, and he has served as a Danforth Associate, a program which acknowledges "outstanding college teachers who are recognized for an interest in scholarship and as a person who seeks to improve faculty-student relationships."

Latterell becomes the second UMM faculty person to receive the John Tate Award. Karla Klinger, director of the Morris Learning Center at UMM, was among the first three recipients of the Tate Award in 1987.

Hinds to Attend Japanese Institute

Dr. Harold Hinds, professor of history at the University of Minnesota, Morris, is one of 22 participants chosen from across the United States for the National Institute of Incorporating Japanese Studies into the Undergraduate Curriculum.

Sponsored by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, Washington, D.C., the month-long program will be held this summer at the Japan Studies Institute at San Diego State University.

In making the announcement, Juliette Gregory, program associate at the Japan Studies Institute, said "Dr. Hinds demonstrates the dedication to teaching, to broadening his knowledge of Japanese studies, and to the internationalization of the undergraduate curriculum that will infuse the month-long institute with the enthusiasm and professionalism necessary to ensure its success."

UMM Chancellor Jack Imholte said, "We're pleased that Dr. Hinds has been accepted. His involvement should bring new perspective about another culture to our campus."

Hinds, who joined the UMM faculty in 1977, earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon, Eugene, and his master's and doctoral degrees from Vanderbilt University, Nashville,

Tenn., focusing on Latin American history.

He is a noted scholar in the Latin American Section of the Popular Culture Association and active with the North Central Council of Latin Americanists. He has had numerous articles published in scholarly journals both in the United States and in Latin American countries. He has presented papers and lectures on Latin American popular culture at colleges and universities throughout the country and has done extensive research and study in Mexico and Columbia, South America.

"I'm pleased to have been accepted to this institute," Hinds said. "I'm looking forward to the institute so I can learn more about the Japanese culture through this intense and in-depth immersion program." Hinds also said that this Institute would help him with a research component he is interested in — comparing a strong capitalist country like Japan to a Third World country such as Mexico.

"This will also enable me to enhance the resources, such as library materials, about Japan and the Japanese culture in the larger Morris community," Hinds said. The National Institute on Incorporating Japanese Studies into the Undergraduate Curriculum will meet from June 18 to July 15.

National Science Foundation Cites Three UMM Students

Three students at the University of Minnesota, Morris have been recognized for outstanding scholastic achievement by the National Science Foundation (NSF), Washington, D.C., according to James Olson, chairperson of the UMM Division of Science and Mathematics.

The NSF has named two of the students NSF Graduate Research Fellows and one was named NSF Graduate Research Honorable Mention. The two NSF Research Fellows are Patrick Walsh, Mapleton, MN, and Bradley DeLeeuw, Hutchinson, MN. Marcia Miller, Cambridge, MN, was named Honorable Mention.

NSF Graduate Fellowships are awarded to students in or near the beginning of their graduate study in science or engineering. The fellowship consists of a three-year \$12,300 stipend and tuition paid at the university of the fellow's choice. Olson said that in the past 25 years, UMM has had only three previous recipients of NSF Fellowships. There have been no known previous UMM individuals designed NSF Honorable Mention.

UMM Students Present Research at National Undergraduate Conference

Four seniors at the University of Minnesota, Morris were invited to present their research projects at the National Conference of Undergraduate Research held April 27-29 at Trinity University in San Antonio, TX.

The students are Mark A. Gisi, Browns Valley; Cristin G. Gross, Watertown, SD; Janet M. Lutter, Howard Lake; and David M. Johnson, Morris.

Gisi, a geology major, presented "A Study of Nitrate Concentrations in Ground Water Wells in West Central Minnesota." His research focused on the study of 28 individual wells to determine the extent, source and cause of nitrate contamination in rural ground water wells. Gisi worked with Peter Whelan, assistant professor of geology at UMM, on the project.

Gross, a biology major, spoke on "Temperature Shift Effects on Daily Rhythms," examining how circadian rhythms continue to function under varying conditions. Gross worked with Van Gooch, associate professor of biology, on the project.

Lutter, a speech communication and Spanish major, presented research

from her project titled "Long-Distance Love: A Study of Communication Patterns in Commuting Relationships." Lutter explains that commuter relationships in which romantic partners live in different geographic locations is an area which has been developing only within the last two decades. Her study examines the various patterns of communication which develop during such relationships. Lutter worked with Dawn Braithwaite, instructor of speech communication, on her project.

Johnson, a German major, examined the breakthrough in acting techniques achieved by the German expressionists in his project titled "German Expressionist Theater: An Artistic Revolution." His presentation included a brief summary of the social and political milieu from which the expressionist movement emerged, followed by an overview of changes in acting theory and staging. An experienced actor himself, Johnson demonstrated some of the acting techniques of the expressionist movement. Johnson worked with Ray Sibul, assistant professor of German, on the project.

Stender Tours USSR on Greco-Roman Team

The sport of wrestling is often referred to as a learning experience, and University of Minnesota, Morris grappler Kipp Stender will receive both classroom and on-the-mat education in the art of Greco-Roman competition next month in the Soviet Union.

Stender, a UMM junior from Clarissa, will be one of more than 20 United States and Canadian collegiate wrestlers touring the Soviet Union May 26-June 3 as part of the American Cultural International Exchange Program. Stender applied and was accepted as a team member in late March, following the NAIA national tournament.

While in the Soviet Union, team members will attend daily classes in either freestyle or Greco-Roman wrestling (as per individual preference) and will have two on-the-mat workouts. The team will spend three days in Leningrad and three days in Moscow and will wrestle Soviet teams in each city. The wrestlers will train at the Olympic Center during their Moscow stay.

Stender, an NAIA All-American, said, "I've never wrestled other than folkstyle (high school and collegiate), and I want to learn how to wrestle Greco-Roman," he said. "The Russians are leaders in the field (of Greco-Roman), so I can learn the right technique in the beginning. I'm really looking forward to that — they can teach me the best way to be a better Greco-Roman wrestler and that should help me in folkstyle competition, too."

The U.S.-Canadian team will leave from Montreal May 26 following some preliminary workouts, and the eight-day, seven-night trip will also include a day in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

UMM Earns Two Academic All-Americans at NAIA Tourney

Two seniors at the University of Minnesota, Morris, Dan Honsey of Stewartville, MN, and Blaine Novak of Foley, MN, were named to the 1989 18-member National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Academic All-American wrestling team. The announcement was made at the 32nd annual NAIA national tournament held at the Jamestown (ND) Civic Center March 2-4.

Honsey, a German and political science major, topped the scholar-athlete list with a grade point average of 3.68. Novak, who was also an Academic All-American in 1988, is an elementary education major with a 3.19 gpa.

To be named to the Academic All-American team, a recipient must be either a junior or senior, maintain a 3.0 or higher gpa, have a winning wrestling record and qualify for the national tournament. Honsey won two matches and lost two in this year's tournament and finished the year with a 23-18 record. Novak posted a 1-2 tournament record and was 18-10-1 overall.

This marked the third straight year UMM has had two Academic All-American wrestlers. Mike Hendrickson, Morris, and Paul Court, Albany, were named to the 1987 team, while Court and Novak were recipients last year.

Cougar Wrestling Camp Teams UMM Alumni and Young Students in Daily Sessions

When UMM's annual Cougar Wrestling Camp gets underway July 9-13, participants will have the opportunity to learn from three former UMM wrestlers. Former Cougars Duane Koslowski ('81), Tom Beyer ('81), and Jim Williamson ('88) will serve among 6 camp clinicians on hand to train the 80 to 100 youths expected to attend. Drawn from across the state of Minnesota, the young wrestlers, ages 10 to 18 years, will participate in three sessions per day for the four days of the camp. According to coach Steve Carr, "This marks the eighth year of the Cougar Wrestling Camp, and we expect to enjoy another successful program."

Koslowski earned eighth place in Greco-Roman style wrestling, super heavyweight division, in the 1988 Seoul Summer Olympics. Beyer was UMM's first national champion and a three times All American winner for UMM. Williamson is also a three times All American winner who is presently nurturing Olympic aspirations.

Football Gazette Names Three UMM All-Americans

Stan Zweifel, head football coach at the University of Minnesota, Morris, announced that three Cougar players have been named to the Football Gazette's All-American College Division Football team.

Named to the second team is Bill Magnuson, a 6-foot, 190-pound junior running back from Park Rapids, MN, and named to the third team are Joel Foss, a 6-foot-4-inch, 295-pound center senior, from Foley, MN, and Tim Frischmon, a 6-foot-1-inch, 205-pound senior defensive end from St. Francis, MN.

During the 1988-89 season, Magnuson caught 29 passes for 311 yards. His three-year totals are 2,469 yards rushing and 25 touchdowns, 51 catches for 583 yards and three touchdowns.


"He has simply been one of the most outstanding runningbacks in the country the past two seasons," Zweifel said. "We are really looking forward to his final year at UMM."


