BOBBY SHEW, BRASS

Bobby joined the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra (under the direction of Sam Donahue), where he performed a lot with Charlie Shavers. Shortly after he joined the Woody Herman Band (on Bill Chase's recommendation) and following this he played for Della Reese for a year and then joined the *Buddy Rich Big Band* just as it was being formed. Many other similar situations followed and Bobby played lead trumpet for a number of pop stars. This led to Bobby settling in Las Vegas for nine years, where he played for hundreds of acts at many hotels. Bobby decided to make a move to the Los Angeles area in order to get re-involved in developing as a jazz soloist rather than strictly as a lead player for which he had become widely known. Since that time, Bobby spent time with the groups of Art Pepper, Bud Shank, Horace Silver Quintet, Frank Strazzer-Sam Most Quintet, as well as numerous big bands such as Bill Holman, Louie Bellson, Toshiko Akiyoshi-Lew Tabackin, Oliver Nelson, Bill Berry, Nat Pierce-Frank Capp Juggernaut, Ed Shaughnessy, Terry Gibbs, Benny Goodman, Maynard Ferguson, Neal Hefti, Don Menza, and Bob Florence. During this time he also did a lot of studio work, including

Shows such as "Hawaii-5-O," "Streets Of San Francisco," "Bob Newhart," "Mary Tyler Moore," "Midnight Specials," "Don Kirschner Rock Concert," "Mork And Mindy," "Happy Days," "Laverne And Shirley," and "Eight Is Enough." His work on soundtracks include "Greece I and II," "Rocky I and II," "Six-Pack," "The Muppet Movie," "The Drivers" and "Taxi." Several of Bobby's albums have received very high accolades from critics, as well as high placement of the airplay charts. One such album, "Outstanding In His Field" was nominated for a GRAMMY while another album, "Heavy Company" was awarded the Jazz Album Of The Year. He continues to tour internationally and to produce and record excellent music. He has just released an album with renowned music educator, Jamey Aebersold and one other with The Metropole Jazz Orchestra under the direction of Rob Pronk. Bobby Shew never stops using this remarkable insight, sensitivity and creativity to inspire the next

generation of jazz players and teachers.

STEVE HOUGHTON, RHYTHM

Houghton's first career break came in 1975 when he performed with the One O'Clock in competition at the Wichita Jazz Festival; jazz great pianist Bill Evans was an adjudicator and The Herd was featured guest band. Herman was seeking a new rhythm section and asked Houghton's percussion teacher to recommend a pianist, bassist and drummer. His teacher recommended the rhythm section of the One O'Clock, and Herman hired all three players on the spot. Houghton's quiet, gentle demeanor belies the power of his performance, but it didn't fool Boston-based jazz vibraphonist Gary Burton, who contracted his services in the summer of 1979, thus



providing the drummer's second major career break. Seeking a change, Houghton had moved from Texas to California earlier that year, and so commuted from Los Angeles to Boston. Houghton's next job was in Los Angeles with female bandleader Toshiko Akiyoshi, with whom he toured for two years. Between trips, his calendar began to fill quickly with recording dates in Los Angeles studios, and his fourth big break came in 1980 when he substituted for trumpeter Freddie Hubbard's drummer at the Keystone Corner in San Francisco on a one-night performance that extended into a two-year commitment. A prolific author/composer, Houghton has written more than 20 composite educational publications/compositions and produced five educational videos, He represents Pearl/Adams (drum sets, timpani and mallet instruments), Calato (sticks), Innovative Percussion (mallets), Zildjian (cymbals) and Remo (drumheads). His recording credits as leader include "Remembrances" (Warner/Belwin) and "Steve Houghton" (Signature Series Mesa/Bluemoon). He also may be heard on recordings with jazz legends including those described above, Carl Fontana, Joe Henderson, Scott Henderson, Rosemary Clooney and Billy Childs, and with pop artists including Doc Severinsen, Barbra Streisand, Barry Manilow, Maureen McGovern, Melissa Manchester and Johnny Mathis Millions have heard his performances on backgrounds of televised shows, including "Northern Exposure," "Love and War," "Coach," "War and Ranembrances," "Matlock," and "American Country Music Awards." His work also may be heard on numerous film scores, including "Return of Jafar," the sequel to "Aladdin;" and on national ad campaigns of ESPN, Apple Computers, Panasonic, Budweiser; GM, Ford, Mazda and Toyota products and Reebok.


Jazz I to back Bobby Shew and Steve Houghton

The University of Minnesota, Morris currently has four jazz ensembles and twelve jazz combos. All of the UMM Jazz Ensembles tour every year, including biennial trips to New Orleans. UMM jazz musicians have performed for many music conventions, including the Minnesota Music Educators Association and the North Central Music Educators National Conference. They have also performed at a variety of formal functions including University of Minnesota's Presidential Inauguration for Mark Yudof and have been featured at many festivals, clinics, performing art series, and various other private events. In July of 1991, the UMM Jazz Ensemble was one of 25 Big Bands from around the world to perform at the 25th Annual Montreux Jazz Festival in Montreux, Switzerland. During Memorial Day Weekend of 1992, they performed at Carnegie Hall with the Count Basie Band. In July of 1994, they performed in the North Sea Jazz Festival at the Hague. In the summer of 1997, the UMM Jazz Ensemble made return appearances at both the Montreux and North Sea Jazz Festivals.
