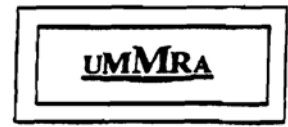
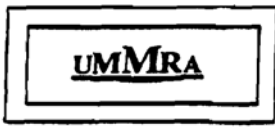

OPENING CONVOCATION NOTES

Following are points made by Chancellor Johnson at the August 15 opening convocation.

- We balanced our budget again last year, ending with a surplus, and have established a contingency/reserve fund.
- UMM is on track to meet the number of degree seeking students used (1795) to establish this year's budget. When non-degree students are included, the total is likely to be in the mid-1800s. Numbers aren't official until ten days into fall semester.
- Of the entering first year class (again, unofficially), 39.1% are first generation college students 9.7% are out-of-state, 2.1 % are international, and 26.9 % are students of color. Their average ACT score is 25.2.
- The new student retention rate from first year fall (2010) to second year fall (2011) was 86.47%.
- Approval has been given to begin work on the budget for the planned, and much needed, Green Prairie Living and Learning Center. It will have 72 beds and will be located on the other side of the barn where the land slopes. 95% of new high school admits and half of all students live on the UMM campus.
- Market research has shown that the top reason all prospective students and parents choose a college is the quality of academic programs. UMM internal audiences (faculty, staff, students and alumni) perceive this quality to be very high. Our new messages about UMM will focus on the quality of our programs and faculty. Another important strength for both internal and external audiences is UMM's affiliation with the University of Minnesota.
- 95% of UMM alumni surveyed rate UMM good or very good. 85% of internal audiences would "do it again" in terms of working or studying here. 94 % of UMM's 2011 (continued on page 2)
