A WARM WELCOME TO 2006

Weatherwise, this January is the warmest January in Minnesota since 1901 when they started keeping temperature records. The past year, 2005, was the warmest since 1944; we will see if 2006 breaks that record. Also, this January a spacecraft called New Horizons was sent into space for the first close-up look at the planet, Pluto, discovered in 1930 by astronomer Clyde Tombaugh. (One report said his ashes were on the spacecraft.) If successful, the mission will complete the initial exploration of all nine planets of the solar system. The journey will reach Pluto in nine and a half years, 2015. Will UMMRA INFO still be in existence to report on it?

Our first year in Morris we rented a cottage on Lake Minnewaska, then rented a house on West Sixth Street and then built our current home on Northridge Drive. Our son, Brian, started kindergarten. Rodney Briggs and I were both teachers on the St. Paul campus. Briggs had been hired to be Provost at the new campus at Morris. One day while eating at the dining hall someone across the room shouted "Hey, Ralph, I would like to talk to you." We got

together after lunch and he asked me to be a faculty member at Morris and organize the music groups. He couldn't hire me until he hired a counselor. That man was Steve Granger. My first assignment from Rod was to write a UMM hymn. We had a little over 200 students. I organized a choir, band, orchestra and men's chorus. I recruited some string players from Morris and surrounding towns to help in the orchestra. Jim Carlson, a senior at Glenwood High School, helped out in the band with his trumpet. Kay (Joranger) Carlson, a senior at Morris High School, helped out the group as a piano accompanist. Both of them later became UMM faculty members. Edson Hall was packed for every concert. The music groups did a lot to make UMM known. The School of Agriculture still had some years to go before it was closed so some of the faculty became faculty at UMM. Also, some of the students joined the music groups so the two schools sort of blended together. Everybody helped, including spouses, when some help was needed anywhere on campus. My wife, Martha, played violin in the orchestra. The first year students all wore maroon beanies. When they wore their maroon beanies they helped spread the word that there is a University of Minnesota at Morris.

The first year was an exciting and memorable year!!!!
