<u>Rationale for Changes or Exceptions:</u>	THIS COURSE TAKES STUDENTS CHRONOLOGICALLY AND GEOGRAPHICALLY THROUGH SCOTLAND'S INTELLECTUAL FERMENT OF THE 18TH CENTURY. STUDENTS WILL BE EXPOSED TO WORK OF THE PERIOD'S MOST IMPORTANT THINKERS AND TO THE PRACTICAL EXPERIMENTATION THAT ACCOMPANIED THE DEVELOPMENT OF MODERN IDEAS ABOUT CAPITALISM, VICE AND VIRTUE. STUDENTS WILL ALSO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO MEET WITH AND DISCUSS THE WORK OF SEVERAL PROMINENT SCHOLARS OF THE SCOTTISH ENLIGHTENMENT, IN THE UNIVERSITY CITIES WHERE HUME, SMITH, AND OTHERS LIVED AND WORKED. THE COURSE COMBINES PRIMARY SOURCE READINGS IN PHILOSOPHY AND ECONOMICS WITH HISTORICAL READINGS ON THE CONTEXT WITHIN WHICH THOSE PRIMARY SOURCES WERE PRODUCED, ENCOURAGING STUDENTS TO UNDERSTAND THE RELATIONSHIPS AMONG SOCIAL, POLITICAL, AND INTELLECTUAL DEVELOPMENTS.
