**POL 3267. CE: Courtroom Proceedings in American State ~~and Federal~~ Courts** (SS; 4 cr; prereq-1201 or #; offered when feasible; summer)

Understanding courtroom procedure by observation of actual courtroom activity. Observation of a wide range of judicial proceedings, including arraignments, trials, sentencing, involuntary commitments to mental and alcohol treatment facilities, and the acceptance of negotiated settlements and/or plea-bargains. Observation of state ~~and federal~~ courts at both the trial and appellate level.

Rationale (see instructions):

Due to the scheduling and travel difficulties encountered while trying to observe federal courts during the past few years, the professor has determined that it is no longer in the best interest of the class to continue to observe federal courts.
