UMM Summer Session For Immediate Release
Begins

As the current academic year draws to a close this week, final preparations are being completed at the University of Minnesota, Morris for the second annual summer session which opens next Monday, June 17.

The session is open to high school graduates under regular entrance regulations, to students already admitted to the University, and to those who are or have been in attendance at any accredited collegiate institution and who are in good standing. Persons 24 years of age or older who wish to complete specific college subjects will be considered for admission as adult special. There are no non-resident restrictions.

Twelve University courses in English, history, psychology, education, humanities, mathematics and sociology will be offered. Classes will meet every weekday during the five-week session which ends July 20.

Orientation and registration will be held on Monday, June 17. Tuition and fees for full-time students (resident or non-resident) are \$70.50 for the term. Part-time students (those taking four credits or less) will pay \$57.50 in tuition and fees. Such fees are payable at the time of registration.

Most of the facilities of the regular UMM academic year will be available to summer school students including the library, residence halls, bookstore, dining hall, swimming pool and other recreational facilities. A fine arts film series has been scheduled with one film to be shown each week during the session at no charge to summer students and their guests. The complete counseling facilities of the University of Minnesota, Morris are available to summer students.

Courses to be offered this summer are: Hum 1. Humanities in the Modern World;

Engl 74. Modern Novel; Hist 69, Europe in the Twentieth Century; Hist 21. United States in the Nineteenth century; Psy 1. General Psychology; Psy 63. Child Psychology; Ed 53. Introduction to Education: The Elementary School and Curriculum; Ed 80. History of Education; Soc 1. Man in Modern Society; Soc 55. Social Control of Deviant Behavior and Conflict; Math 71. Selected Modern Mathematical Topics for Elementary Teachers; and Math 72. Selected Modern Mathematical Topics for Secondary Teachers.

All of the courses are offered for three college credits each or may be audited with permission from the Office of Student Services.
