On Monday, February 17, at 7 p.m. in the Student Center's Edson Auditorium, the festival will feature *De rouille et d'os / Rust and Bone*. Directed by Jacques Audiard, 2012, 120 minutes, not rated. This invigorating melodrama centers on the explosive chemistry of two damaged souls: the penniless Ali, who has traveled south to Antibes with his five-year-old son in the hopes of starting a new life, and Stéphanie, a whale trainer who becomes a double amputee after an accident at the marine mammal park where she works. We witness the evolution of their tumultuous relationship that, despite (or because of) their many differences and the obstacles they face, results in nothing less than a great love story.

The Careers in Biology Alumni Speaker Series includes talks from Morris alumni about the diverse jobs in various fields of biology. Susan Seim Listberger '07 will deliver the next lecture, "Fish, Foams and Fats—One Bio Major's Fateful Journey," on February 20 at 7 p.m. in Science 2950. The talk is free and open to the public. She will give a classroom talk, "The Ester—An Introduction to Vegetable Oil Chemistry," on Friday, February 21, at 8 a.m. in Science 3650. Listberger graduated from Morris with a degree in biology and theatre arts in 2007. She is currently pursuing a masters of business administration at St. Cloud State University. Prior to becoming the business development project manager for Cargill, Listberger served the company as an application development chemist and a laboratory technician. The Careers in Biology Program is supported in part by a grant to the University of Minnesota, Morris from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute through the Precollege and Undergraduate Science Education Program.
